The void which we have felt in our lives for the past two years swiftly vanishes as the ferryboat approaches *Piso Aetos. Thiaki* always beautiful, always welcomes us with open arms.

Despite Covid lingering, and despite no hugs and kisses, it is a wonderful feeling to see people dear to us once more and to be able to talk face to face rather than via a screen. Visitors have started arriving for holidays, in particular diaspora Ithacans. The villages are once again lit up and filled with life; *Vathy* is a panorama with the harbour full of yachts, as is *Frikes, Kioni, Poli, Afales* and every beach; and the restaurants and cafes have re-opened for a busy summer season.

On looking around, one would not know the havoc inflicted on the island by the 2020 Janus medicane. It is wonderful to see the restoration work carried out at various sites that suffered damage and which we, Ithacans and friends of Ithaca from Australia and the diaspora, contributed to. Works included the stairs to Afales and Kourvoulia beaches, the Frikes seafront, Kioni's paved waterfront thoroughfare, Stavros' kiosk housing the model of Odysseus palace, the church on Lazaretto, and the rooves of the Thalassa Museum and of the building housing the Dimitris Paizi Dania exhibition. I felt enormous joy that we were able to contribute even in the smallest way.

The weather is perfect for swimming, however, there is a problem with jellyfish at some of the beaches! People are cautious, choosing to swim at safer beaches, but once immersed in the deep blue waters, any concerns dissipate, generating hope that all will be fine and that corona virus as well as the jellyfish will disappear...

During the summer months the island stages many cultural events, including music recitals and concerts, lectures, traditional dance performances and theatre productions, which I will report on in our next edition. To those travelling to our beloved *Thiaki*, my best wishes for a happy and safe holiday.



IN SEARCH OF HOMERIC ITHACA

Jonathan Brown

In Search of Homeric Ithaca

On Sunday 19 June members and guests enjoyed a fascinating presentation by Jonathan Brown, former diplomat and international lawyer and author of *In Search of Homeric Ithaca* (pictured below with Peter Raftopoulos, IHS President).

Brown's presentation, based on his book, examined the traditional view that Homer's Ithaca is the modern-day island of Ithaki, as well as referencing other theories that have placed it elsewhere. Through his analytical approach informed by wide research into historical, literary and archaeological sources, and above all his own exploration of Ithaki, he was able to demonstrate for the first time, several Ithacan landmarks that conform closely to the words and action of the *Odyssey*.



The book contains a detailed analysis of the Odyssey, drawing on ancient and modern scholarly texts, reproduces antique and contemporary maps, and satellite imagery, and quotes from the accounts of earlier travellers and topographers.

In his review of the book (Odysseus Issue 3-2020) George Paxinos, author of *Passage to Ithaca* and *The Ithacans*, recommends that "...if you only ever read one serious work on the subject this must be it. ... Seeing Ithaki through Brown's astute vision and reasoned argument, we come away with an enhanced understanding of the island that few of us know as well as the author."

The Ithacan Historical Society highly recommends *In Search of Homeric Ithaca* to all lovers of Homer and Ithaki alike.



Celebrating the near centenary residency at 922 Drummond St, North Carlton, Victoria

On Saturday 26th February 2022 the extended Vlassopoulos family gathered to celebrate the near centenary of the Vlassopoulos family's residence at 922 Drummond Street, North Carlton.

John (Ioannis) Anastasios Vlassopoulos (paratsoukli Kioukiouri) from Lahos, Ithaca, purchased the house in 1927 and four generations (and many cats and a few other pets) have lived here. Prior to the purchase of the house, John brought his wife Ekaterina (Patrikios) and their son Peter, who were living in Lahos, to Australia. Four children were born in Australia - George, Victoria, Eutichia and Jim.


Descendants of Victoria, Eutichia and Jim attended this memorable day. Peter and George did not have children. All five siblings are no longer with us, but their presence was felt especially through their children and grandchildren.

Rosa McCall, first cousin to the Vlassopoulos siblings, attended and told us stories of her memories of visiting 922 with her parents, Andrew (John's brother) and Edna. Melita Vlassopoulos, Jim's wife, gave her reflections. Since arriving in Australia in 1955, Melita has lived at 922 all that time, except for a brief visit to Brisbane where she stayed with her mother's family before she married. There were two functions on the day, a morning tea for the immediate family, and in the evening, a house party for friends who have been part of the Vlassopoulos' family over the decades. It was a momentous occasion for everyone who attended, people meeting face to face after Covid lockdowns, others who had not seen each other for many years and friends.

Guests were asked to record their memories of 922. The common thread connecting these reflections was the warmth and the generosity gifted to everyone, Melita's beautiful garden, the ancient lemon trees, the many celebrations for Greek Easter, Christmas, birthdays, and countless dinners. The grandchildren reflected on Papou Jim – Mr Fix It. So many memories flooding the pages of the notebook.

Keep the memories alive for future generations...

During the past two years, many of us found the lockdowns, restrictions and stay at home orders very challenging. For my Aunty Toula (Afrodite) Paizis, née Mavrokefalou, aged 82, who lives in Johannesburg, South Africa, it was a very difficult time. Her daughter, my cousin, Helen Mastrantonis, now living in Perth, and knowing that her mum was alone in South Africa with very little family around her, devised an ingenious plan to distract her mother. She persuaded her to put pen to paper and write about her most vivid memories of her childhood in Exoghi, Ithaca.

Compiling her mother's stories and poems and adding precious family photographs, Helen produced two photobooks, one of her mother's poetry and stories and the other of her childhood memories in Exoghi, the village she has nostalgically held close to her heart. In a poem about her beloved birthplace she writes:

Perched high on the ridges, proud and beautiful Exoghi, that whoever finds themselves up there, can see that God speaks, the ravines echo and the heavens

Toula also penned stories about her much-loved sister, my mother, Athena Zafiratos and Helen produced a photobook especially for her. When these very special photobooks arrived in the mail addressed to my mum, in Melbourne, she poured over every word, every syllable, every poetic phrase her sister had written while tears cascaded down her cheeks. Seeing the photographs in these books stirred her emotionally beyond her expectations. These photos were from more untroubled times. How we all long for these days to return. My sister and I are so grateful to Helen who gifted us the photobooks which will live on for generations in our family.

Considering how much joy the photobooks brought to us, I encourage others to take the trip down memory lane and preserve their own family history and memories. Document the stories, collect photographs and memorabilia. Produce a photobook, maybe a novel, maybe a film! Produce a gift that keeps on giving from one generation to the next!

VALE JAMES (JIM) PAIZIS 1924-2022



Jim, pictured above in 1944, was the son of Ithacan immigrants from Kioni, Aristomenis and Penelopi Paizis who married in Melbourne in 1923. He was the first-born, followed by his sisters Despina, Sophia and Marina. He attended Carlton Primary School, North Fitzroy Central and University High School. He worked as a clerk at the YMCA for two years before joining the navy in 1942 aged eighteen. In the post war years, he spent most of his working life with the Australian Wheat Board and as an accountant at Box Hill Hospital.


Jim was the last living serviceman of a total of 316 Australian Greeks who served in the New Guinea Campaign in World War 2. He was the only officer of Greek origin to serve in the Australian Navy during the war, achieving Sub-Lieutenant rank. He served on corvettes, the HMAS Glenelg and the HMAS Colac, which had the task of protecting convoys of ships carrying troops, supplies and cargo from Japanese submarines that operated along Australia's eastern seaboard and further north. Jim served as a midshipman on the Glenelg and as a Gunnery Officer on the Colac and, at the end of the war, as a Gunnery Officer on the frigate HMAS Lachlan which was surveying the harbours for the navy's charts.

Over the years Jim maintained a close association with the Navy and had been part of the Corvette Association which holds annual reunions at the towns which inspired the names of the corvettes. He was also a great friend and supporter of the Shrine of Remembrance, donating memorabilia and his time to several Shrine public programs, media and ceremonial events.

Married to Val for 68 years, Jim is survived by his two sons and a daughter, six grandchildren and (as at the end of 2020) thirteen greatgrandchildren.

The wartime story below in the article *Razor Sharp Reminder* is a story which Jim kept to himself for much of his life, a story of enduring friendship formed under the most traumatic experiences.

RAZOR SHARP REMINDER By Jen Kelley, HeraldSun May 25 2022



For most of his 97 years, Jim Paizis kept a razor at eye level in his bathroom cabinet as a daily reminder of the mate he lost on one of the worst days of his life.

Jim's three kids growing up in their Balwyn home, knew the razor held enormous significance to their dad, though it took years for the full story to emerge.

As they learned, Sub Lieutenant Jim Paizis was a gunnery officer on HMAS Colac, which came ubder intense shelling by the Japanese in the Solomon Islands on May 26, 1945. Jim's 20-year-old mate, steward Brian "Percy" Shute, was one of two men killed in action on that horrific day.

Reeling from the loss, Jim was left with the razor he'd borrowed from Percy the morning before and it became a precious reminder of his fallen mate. As Jim's son Graeme recalls, the

As Jim's son Graeme recalls, the razor sat in his dad's bathroom cabinet as a lifelong memento, from after the war ended until he had to go into care last November.

I can remember watching Dad shave as a little kid does, and there was always this razor there in the cabinet," he says. "He must have said something about it, because we knew, don't touch that razor."

After Jim died aged 97 on February 14

this year, his family with the help of the navy and RSL, launched a search to find Percy's family in Western Australia to return the razor.

Incredibly, one of those who got word of the search was none other than the boy who delivered the sad news to Percy's distraught mother in 1945.

"Next thing they got an email from this guy who was a 16-year-old telegram boy who could remember delivering the telegram to Percy's mother," Graeme says.

The search also found Percy's sister Maureen, now 90, who was 13 when she was standing beside her mother at the awful moment she received the telegram.

Remarkably, both Maureen and the former delivery boy now live in the same aged care home.

Percy's family wanted the razor to be presented to the Colac RSL for public display, to commemorate his life and service on HMAS Colac.

It will join a considerable trove of memorabilia relating to HMAS Colac at Colac RSL when it is presented by the navy on Thursday. For Graeme, knowing the razor will be on display for decades to come is a fitting end to its long journey.

"It's very emotional, because I knew what it meant to Dad," he says.

Argos, A "Greek" beagle from 2,500 years ago!

What is in a name? Well, apparently quite a lot. When we choose a name for a dog, it usually has some special significance for us — it may be the colour of the dog's eyes, his coat, the way she behaves, or just a name that we liked and so on. Likewise, breeders sometimes allocate a unique theme to a line of dogs that may be of special significance to them, depending on what they set out to do. And even sometimes by chance, names appear out of nowhere that go back thousands of years — such is the story of our family dog, **ARGOS**.

Originally, my parents came from Greece (1940s & 50s) and lived a beautiful life together in Australia before, sadly, my mother died in 2000. We had always loved beagles, so my sister convinced us to buy a companion dog for our father – I think she really wanted the dog for herself at the time! Well, we looked around and found a breeder and after a meet and greet with quite a few of her dogs, we stumbled across a very cheeky dog called **HOMER**. This dog was named after *Homer*, the Greek poet of the *Iliad* and the *Odyssey*. The dog was from a line of beagles named the *Odysseus* breed.



The name **HOMER** had an incredible special connection to our family. First coincidence: my father, **George Pippos**, pictured above with **HOMER**, was born on the island of Ithaca, the fabled kingdom of *Odysseus*, the noble king in the stories of the Iliad and the *Odyssey* by *Homer*! The dog was a natural fit for our family, and we did not think much of it at the time. We will always remember how important **HOMER** was to our father in his twilight years – he was his best friend and followed dad around everywhere.

Unfortunately, our father passed away after a few years and none of us were in a position to take **HOMER** so we found a lovely family for him close by...... the owner's name was most unusual and although I knew the name well, I had never met anyone before with that name. **Second coincidence**: the new owner's name was **HECTOR**, the Prince of Troy, from the story of the *Iliad*. Once again, I did not think much of it at the time; it was just one of those things.

As time went by, we became more settled in our life and felt it was the right time to have another dog in the family, and so we searched for another beagle. I had seen lots of puppies for sale but could not find a breeder in Brisbane who had a litter back then. Eventually, we did find a breeder up north who had some eight-week-old puppies ready to come into our family. There was one puppy in the photographs that just had that look, you know the look that just hypnotises you and drags you in. So then in 2015, we brought home a male beagle and decided to call him ARGOS – the mythical name of the faithful dog that waited for 20 years for his master King Odysseus to return from the Trojan War. Obviously, we chose this name to remember our father and where he came from - it was part of our family DNA and a name with special meaning for us.

However, the story of **ARGOS** does not end here. **ARGOS** (like most beagles) is a natural tracker (coincidentally, *Homer*, the poet, mentions this as one of the special characteristics of the mythical *Argos*). We were involved with many of the sports available through Dogs Queensland including lure coursing, showing and tracking and I remember very clearly a day in 2017 when we were at a Dog Show at Durack. A breeder approached me and asked about our dog, **ARGOS**. One thing for sure, these breeders know their dogs – "He looks very much like one of my champion dogs" she said. So that day when I got home, I checked the pedigree papers and the breeder was indeed correct. Her champion dog was the grandfather of our **ARGOS**.

I began to make a few more enquiries and found out that our **ARGOS**, pictured left, had descended from a dog called **APOLLO**, the ancient Greek god with an active role in the *lliad* (again!). However even more interesting for us was another strange and quirky coincidence that just happened to pop up. **Third coincidence**: we can trace the heritage of our dog **ARGOS** back almost 20 years to the same stable as my father's dog, **HOMER**. Just thinking about this still gives me chills even today. And I used to wonder why breeders go to so much trouble creating such fantastic and imaginative names for their dogs and pedigree lines.

Well, as far as **ARGOS** and the **Pippos Family** are concerned, I am awfully glad they did. What is in a name? Sometimes, more than you will ever know.

The story of Homer's Argos is a classic tale of loyalty of a dog to his master and is probably the earliest recorded history (some 2,500 years ago) of the special relationship that dogs have with humans – to find out about the story of Argos, read the excerpt from Homer's Odyssey at https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Argos_(dog) It is possibly this special bond that Hector (HOMER'S new owner) noticed in HOMER'S behaviour on the day my father passed away – he was acting strangely, howling and yelping early that same morning.



ΡΑUL KOUVARA ΠΑΥΛΟΣ ΚΟΥΒΑΡΑΣ 1933-2022



Paul Sotiris Kouvaras was born in 1933 in Randwick, Sydney to Ithacans Telemachos and Erasmia Kouvaras, a brother to Olga who was four years older. The family had many relatives across Sydney and regional New South Wales, and with the real threat of World War 2 reaching Sydney harbour, Paul, like many other children, was sent away for safety. He went to live in the Southern Tablelands village of Crookwell with his cousin Kath with whom he remained extremely close throughout his life.

Paul attended Randwick Boys High School where he took great interest in French, Latin and History. Later in retirement, he would go back to study at Monash University to obtain a VCE equivalent of Greek studies and enrolled in French and Italian courses at the University of the Third Age. With Nathalie, his nephew Dallas' wife, he loved to practise speaking French and Italian at any opportunity.

On the passing of his father in 1952, Paul assumed the responsibility of caring for his mother Erasmia. They had a special bond and in later years he would refer to her as his best friend. In 1966 Paul and Erasmia relocated to Melbourne to be close to sister Olga who had married John Cosmas. They purchased a house in the same street as Olga's family living opposite each other. The close proximity resulted in a special bond that Paul had with Olga's children, Mia and Dallas.

Paul's working life after completing military service began with the David Jones department store where he went from a junior sales position to a duty manager and department buyer; he himself always maintained a dashing flair for fashion throughout his life. In 1967 Paul gained employment in reservations at TAA which was the domestic airline service now operating as Qantas. Computer useage was very limited at the time. The work of reservations required great accuracy, self-organisation and memory skill to quickly follow the manual data boards as flight availability was updated. Paul excelled and was in his natural element with a fine speaking voice guiding the caller on the telephone through the steps of travel planning. Working with the airline, Paul discovered a whole other 'family' and with his work colleagues he would travel the world, celebrate Christmas and birthdays and be a loyal friend through the good and bad times. He became a staff trainer and was promoted to Yield Management as a flight controller, retiring

Paul was born into a musical family and became great lover and supporter of opera and theatre, He kept an annual subscription to the Melbourne Theatre Company and enjoyed numerous productions at the West End and on Broadway. He would witness performances from Pavarotti to Santana. His ears, eyes and heart were open without prejudice.

In April 2019, Paul faced his greatest challenge when he suffered a severe stroke. The loss of independence was a cruel blow to a person whose life displayed the importance of seeking that which is good and enriching the lives of others by nurturing life-long connections.

ANASTASIA PAIZI-TSILIMIDOS ANAΣΤΑΣΙΑ ΠΑΙΖΗ-ΤΣΙΛΙΜΙΔΟΥ 1940-2022



Tasia was born in Melbourne on the 26 March 1940 to early Greek immigrants from Kioni Ithaka. My grandfather, Alkinoos, arrived in 1918 and married my grandmother Marika, in 1925. Tasia was the third child in the family following Kaleri and Ioanna (both dec).

Growing up in Glenferrie Road Hawthorn, Tasia's home was abuzz and life was never dull. There was swimming at the Glenferrie Baths, imagining herself as Esther Williams, watching the Hawthorn football team on Saturdays at Glenferrie oval, and the family shop filled with Hawthorn players who invariably would face my grandfather's abuse of "You played skata!" but who nonetheless would turn up in droves regularly to catch a glimpse of the dark-haired beauty who was my mother. And when Hawthorn's Ian McCann bravely asked Mum out, and my grandfather ruminated over what a really good idea this might be, the prospect was quickly quashed by the iron fist of her mother, Marika!

There were also the long summer nights at the Hawthorn Cinemas - the Palace and the Glen - which sowed the seed of Tasia's religious obsession for films. It was destiny that she should end up as the next-door neighbour of Ivan Hutchinson, the film critic, who would constantly consult with her on film facts and information. Tasia and her cousins would be chaperoned to the cinemas, and the boys on Glenferrie Road all knew it! Tasia recalled one night they escaped unchaperoned. Uncle George caused such a scene when he came to gather them up. that Mum's friend at school asked, "what happened to you on Saturday night?", and my Mum, too embarrassed to admit the truth of her strict background, went for the far more acceptable and common Aussie excuse of the time, "that was my uncle, he's an alcoholic!" To which her school friends answered, "Oh yeah, so is mine!"

Tasia was an exceptional singer, with a beautiful voice and would often sing at the Ithacan dances in the 1950s-early sixties. She told the story that at one such dance she was just about to begin the old favourite, "Blue Moon", when she overheard one of the boys say out loud, "If she sings that bloody *blue moon* again, I'll neck myself!" She sang it!

In 1962 Tasia married Spiros Tsilimidos from Cephalonia and two children followed, myself, Pelissa (Plousia) and my brother Alkinos. Mum instilled in us a love of music, and a love of film, that turned into a career for my brother Alkino and a repertoire of life teaching moments for me. I entered the English classroom not so much well-read but armed with an arsenal of film quotes such as the quote from our shared love of Wuthering Heights, "I cannot live without my life, I cannot die without my soul" which Mum would recite when talking about romance.

Tasia will be fondly remembered by those close to her in her Ithacan family, but also by many in the Cephalonian and Eptanesian communities where her husband Spiro was

actively involved, serving as President of the Cephalonian Brotherhood for many years.

Beloved wife and mother and adored grandmother of Anastasia, her only grandchild and namesake, Tasia will live on in the hearts of all of us. This unique dynamic and cheeky woman kept us all on our toes as she marked and sparked humour in every moment – even in the most difficult of times.

Denis was a devotee of the arts, regularly attending museums and galleries with his good friend "Renz". He loved listening to classical and Greek folk music. He was an unbeatable chess player who patiently taught his nieces and nephew the art of a quick check mate.

Denis was my tutor and mentor and nurtured my interest in the sciences. I admired Denis because, despite living with schizophrenia, he achieved many career ambitions, made close long-term friends and he remained close to our faith. I know he was happy. In the end what more could one ask from life. We will miss him and cherish the moments we had with him.


